The story takes place in Samaria which was part of the Northern Kingdom of Israel.

There was a famine that was pretty horrific, the people were at the point of eating each other. King Ben-Hadad of Aram was surrounded there. For all the horrible things that were happening there, King Jehoram of Israel was ready to kill the prophet, Elijah.
