Judges 11:1-33

This part will go into depth about the nation of Ammon attacking the Jewish people. The time period this was happening was known as Judges. G-d did forgive them andHe did save them again. His way of saving them was sending Jepthah their way. The Jewish people engaged a man named Jephtah to help lead them in battle against this horrible nation. He was a judge who presided over the Jewish people for six years.

There had been no king or state of union in Israel that were in charge of the Jewish people. The first thing Jepthah did was send a missive to Ammon declaring that he only wanted peace. This missive was a message where he discussed how the Jews had captured the lands of Sichon and Og. The victories Jews had is shared in this particular week's reading. This Jepthah was the son of a woman who happened to be a harlot. He had a father and half-siblings who sent him away from home and he settled into the land of Tob. It doesn't say in so many words in this reading the reason for this, we think it's because of the situation with his mother. Some people think that his mother was a concubine to his father, Gideon. The wife of Gideon (the mother to Jepthah's half brothers) didn't believe he was a rightful heir to Gideon. According to the reading in the Torah, the half brothers of Jepthah did this illegally, because the laws of inheritance dicate any son of a man has equal rights in his estate. There were some people who believed that Jepthah's mother was actually a prostitute. There was never any way to truly prove whether Gideon was Jepthah's father, he couldn't legally get a share of the estate from his half brothers.

Jepthah never had a good relationship with his half brothers. Some sources believe that they wanted to kill him. That was why he left and ended up in the city called Tov, that means good. It was in Tov, he became a great warrior. He was known as a "mighty man of valor". He agreed to lead the Jews in battle against the nation of Ammon on one condition. That condition was, "if you bring me back to fight with the children of Ammon and G-d will deliver them before me. Then I will lead you, the Jewish people, I will become your head." When going to war with the nation of Ammon, he tried to bring a peaceful resolution. In this message he asked the king of Ammon, what is the what is there between you and me?
