Haftarah

This week's Haftarah is the fifth of a series of seven "Haftarot of Consolation." These seven Haftarot started on the Sabbath following the Fast of Tisha b'Av and went on after the Jewish New Year. In this Haftara it says, the words "if the Jewish people are to forsaken the Jerusalem then it is like a woman who is not able to have children." Then G-d joins the Jewish people, and they rejoice and come back together. They proliferate, and they repopulate the Jewish nation all over again. Israel had once been desolate, but now no more is it alone. Now the cities are overflowing with people in it. The prophet Isaiah, assures the people that G-d has not forsaken them. He was only momentarily hiding His face away from them. He is back when they were in their period of exile, He was away, but now He is showing His great mercy to them again.
